What is the Early Years Foundation Stage (E.Y.F.S)?

- The E.Y.F.S. is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.
- It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.



Early Years Curriculum

- Activities in EYFS are carefully planned and organised in order to provide a range of learning experiences. Individual online records are kept by staff to record the activities your child participates in and undertakes, as well as their progress in specific skills. These will be shared with you through 'Tapestry.'
- Planning is carried out using a topic-based approach, following the children's interests and responding to specific events.
- There are 7 Areas of Learning in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), which activities are planned around:
 - **Personal, Social and Emotional Development**
 - **Physical Development**
 - **Communication and Language**
 - **Literacy**
 - **Mathematics**
 - **Understanding the World**
 - **Expressive Arts and Design**
- Throughout the EYFS, children will be working towards the Early Learning Goals. These describe the level of attainment expected at the end of your child's reception year in school.

- Online journal of your child's learning.
- Communicates learning in school and at home.
- You will receive an email to activate your child's journal.

Numbers

0-5 Emerging

- ✓ Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20, place them in order and say which number is one more or one less than a given number. Using quantities and objects, they add and subtract two single-digit numbers and count on or back to find the answer. They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.

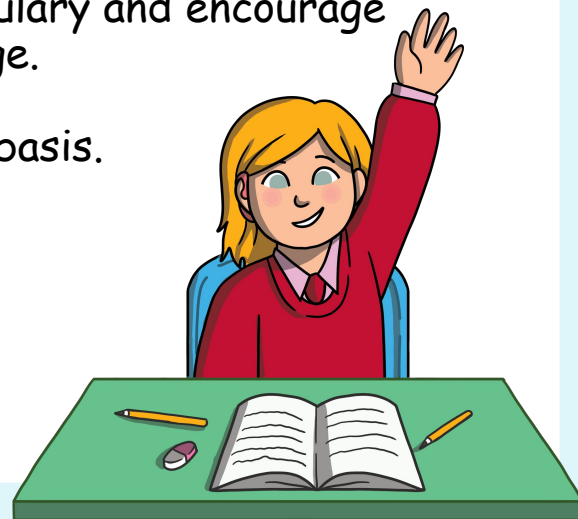
Reception Baseline Assessment

- This is a statutory assessment for all reception children in the country, covering Literacy, Communication & Language and Maths. It comprises short, practical activities for the children to complete with their teacher. The children will not be aware that they are completing an assessment and it is not something that they can prepare for in advance, so please do not worry!
- It is used to measure progress between entering reception and leaving year 6.



Home Learning

- We understand and value the support you provide for your child at home. Early years staff would love to hear about what you and your child have been doing at home. We encourage you to share your child's learning, achievements and experiences with staff through 'Tapestry', as this helps us to build a more complete picture of your child and we can share any achievements with the rest of the class.
- Homework - Your child will be given a reading book and sounds/words to learn within the first few weeks of starting school. Please share these books and sounds on a daily basis.
The initial reading books your child receives will not have words. Please spend time using the pictures to share vocabulary and encourage your child to describe what is happening on each page.
- Share a range of books with your child on a regular basis.



What does being ready for school mean?

Ready children*

- I am curious and want to play and learn
- I feel good about myself and like it when you praise me
- I am starting to know when I am happy, sad or cross
- I can let you know what I need and tell you about what is important to me
- I can settle when you leave me knowing you will be back soon
- I can play with other children and I am learning to take turns
- I can make simple choices
- I am willing to have a go and keep on trying
- I can use lots of different words about things that interest me and use them when I play
- I can listen and take turns in conversation with grown-ups and children
- I can follow simple instructions
- I can join in with favourite songs, rhymes or stories
- I can go to the toilet and dress myself most of the time
- I am an active and confident mover both indoors and outdoors

*If a child is developing typically for their age.

Ready for school?

Small steps can make a big difference...

What can you do to help your child?

- Share lots of books, talking about the pictures and characters. Re-read favourites
- Encourage children to talk, talk, talk
- Reading keywords (own name, labels, shop signs)
- Encourage mark making e.g. shopping lists, notes
- Practise counting at any time-climbing the stairs, toys, food etc. Go on number hunts
- Play simple board games
- Sing number rhymes and songs together
- Play eye spy with my little eye game
- Playdough, scissors, threading, Lego
- Getting dressed, toileting, handwashing

A typical day in our Foundation Class...

- 8.45 Welcome and register
- 9.00-9.15 Assembly gradually introduced
- 9.20-10.30 Daily phonics and literacy
- 10.30 - 11.00 Snack and break time
- 11.00-12.00 Mathematics directed group work and free flow
- 12.00-1.00 Lunch
- 1.00-2.50 Other areas of the curriculum P.E/ UW /Creative
R.E
- 2.50 Tidy away, story and Home Time at 3.15pm

Frequently asked questions:

I cannot find my National Insurance number. What do I do?

Call the National Insurance Enquiries helpline on 0300 200 3500.

Will the Pupil Premium (PP) affect my benefits?

No, if your child receives the PP, it will not affect any benefits you may be entitled to.

How can I ensure the school gets the extra Pupil Premium funding for my child?

You need to find out first if you can register your child for Free School Meals (FSM). You can do this a few months before your child starts school. It is important to register your child for FSM, even if you are going to send a packed lunch with them every day.

Does my child automatically qualify for FSM if they have older brothers/sisters in school who are already registered?

No, you need to register each child.

I need help to make contact with the Free School Meals team. What do you suggest I do?

Your child's teachers in school can answer any questions you may have about the PP and FSM. They will be able to find someone to support you with the registration process.
